

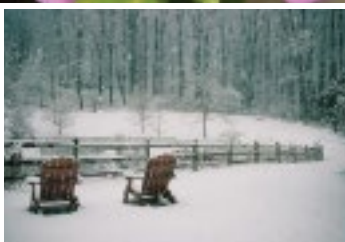

VFARS Lecture Series: Wildflowers of Southern Europe; Greece and Sardinia

Sunday, January 17, 2 pm

Sponsored by the Valley Forge Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society

Presented by Janet Novak

Take a trip to two of Europe's best regions for wildflowers: Greece and Sardinia. Sardinia, the second largest island in the Mediterranean, has many plants that grow nowhere else. Greece has the greatest plant diversity in Europe.

talk will span the range from ancient sites to mountain wilderness, with many stops at meadows dotted with orchids and other showy flowers.

Sardinia and Greece are rich in human history as well as natural history, and the two are intertwined in many ways. Some of the region's wildflowers are immediately familiar because they are the ancestors of cultivated herbs (such as thyme) or crops (such as peas). Some meadows that are rich in wildflowers remain as meadows because goatherds practice traditional low-intensity grazing. And in a particularly intimate intertwining of human and natural history, an endemic bellflower has colonized the ancient stone walls of temples at Delphi. This

Janet is an amateur botanist and gardener living in Philadelphia. She is a proud member of the Rhododendron Society (and of 11 other plant-related societies, ranging from the Philadelphia Botanical Club to the Eriogonum Society). She created the website of the Connecticut Botanical Society and contributed many of its photographs. Janet's photos have also appeared in *Horticulture* magazine and *Peterson's Field Guide to Ferns*. Her educational background, however, is not plants but molecular biology, and she works as a medical editor.

Climate Change – Carbon is the Critical Issue

Presented by Richard Whiteford, an internationally acclaimed climate change expert, writer and environmental activist. He follows current climate science from NOAA, NASA, the National Academies of Science and the United Nations Environmental Program.

This illustrated presentation will describe what is meant by climate change. There will be visual descriptions of some of the supporting science, followed by visual observations of the changing climate. The overarching "critical issue" is the ever increasing levels of carbon dioxide (we pump 110 million tons into the atmosphere every day) and the amount of carbon we have in inventory to burn. The final discussion will be about what things we need to do to prevent the planet from exceeding the two degree increase that scientists say we dare not exceed.

- We must limit submissions to five (5) per applicant.

Entry Fee:

- The fee for entering this exhibition is as follows:
 - For Members: \$10 for the first submission and \$5 for each additional.
 - For Non-Members: \$20 for the first submission and \$10 for each additional.

Selection:

- Judging will be led by award-winning photographer Laura Ducceschi and Bob Lyons, Professor emeritus of the University of Delaware Longwood Graduate Program in Public Horticulture.

Sales:

- Photographers may choose to make their work available for purchase, but this is not a requirement.
- All sales must be handled between the photographer and the purchaser.
- Photographs that are sold must still remain on display until the conclusion of the exhibition.

Awards/Recognition:

- The Committee will select a first, second, and third place in each category and, in recognition of this year's 40th anniversary, monetary awards of \$500 for first place, \$250 for second place, and \$100 for third place will be given for each category.
- In addition to the recognition and monetary award, the winners of each category will be invited to present a slideshow at the closing reception of selected photographs from their entire body of work.

Vietnam Coastal Ecological Restoration

Sunday, February 28, 2 pm

Presented by Susan Doering, Vice President Environmental Underwriting, Tokio Marine Specialty

Mangroves are a critical component of green infrastructure in coastal tropical climates, providing both breeding grounds for aquatic species and protection from damage and erosion caused by storm surge. Why then are thousands of acres of mangroves being decimated? Come hear the experience of one subsistence community in Vietnam that has chosen to restore their mangrove population – and learn a bit about Vietnam's vibrant culture and environmental issues. Susan Doering will talk about her experience as a member of a team from Tokio Marine, on their week-long trip to assist in the restoration of this vital component of the subsistence community.



Ms. Doering has dedicated her career to the environmental field starting in human health risk assessment for a major national environmental consulting firm, then moving to environmental insurance in 1992. She graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a BA in Biology with a focus in Plant Ecology. She is the head of Philadelphia Insurance's environmental sustainability group GreenPHLy, and sits on the boards of the PA Chapter of the Nature Conservancy and the Insurance Society of Philadelphia.

Bee House Building Workshop

Rhododendrons are beloved plants for many gardeners, but few really know how diverse the Genus *Rhododendron* is. On a very basic level this program will discuss with colorful examples the many different groups of rhododendrons, including azaleas, lepidote, and elepidote forms, deciduous and evergreen varieties, flower forms, colors, leaves, plant forms, native American varieties, new hybrids, and the beautiful new forms produced by local hybridizers. Also included are directions for selecting the right plant for a particular site, planting rhododendrons, their maintenance and pruning and some common problems.

Dr. Robert Stamper has been gardening with his wife, Christa, for over 50 years. He has been president of the Valley Forge Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society as well as active in the Delaware Valley Rock Garden Society. Dr. Stamper is now retired after 20 years of teaching in the Biology Department at Muhlenberg College. Come join others and learn from a professor of not just biology but as a professed rhodoholic of azaleas and rhododendrons.

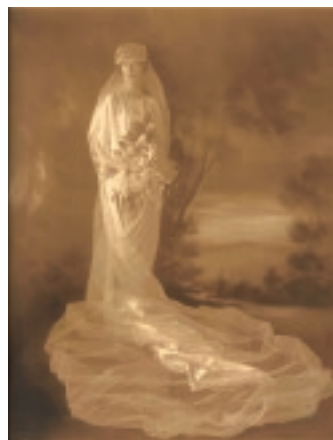

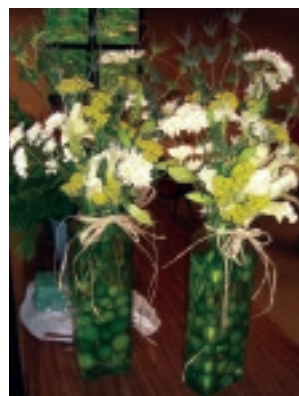

Transforming the Viaduct

Sunday, April 10, 2 pm

Center City District and design consultants Urban Engineers and Studio|Bryan Hanes are transforming Philadelphia's abandoned Reading Railroad Viaduct into a unique, elevated linear park.

Last used in 1984, the Viaduct's steel structures, elevated filled areas, and arched masonry bridges had become blighted over many years of neglect, but the spectacular views of Philadelphia's Center City remained. Since 2010, Center City District (CCD) has been working in cooperation with the City's Commerce and Parks & Recreation Departments to re-purpose the Viaduct into a green, civic space. CCD was drawn to the project in part because of the success of the High Line Project in New York City, and because it could create an opportunity to add residential and light commercial development in the expanding communities of Center City and Chinatown. With 32% of the land in the area around the Viaduct still vacant and undeveloped, the opportunity exists to create a unique, mixed-use, mixed-income neighborhood like none other in Center City. In March 2012, after extensive community outreach, CCD and the design team of Urban Engineers and Studio|Bryan Hanes began the transformation of the Viaduct into Philadelphia's next great public space.

Fundraising by Center City District and Friends of the Rail Park is currently underway for both construction and long-term maintenance and the project could start as early as 2015.

Angelo is Vice President and the Practice Leader of Environmental Services at Urban Engineers, Inc. (Urban). Angelo has been with Urban since 2000. He has a BS in Environmental Engineering and a Master's in Engineering Management, both from Drexel. Angelo provides environmental solutions to transit and rail authorities, transportation agencies, private developers and industries. He is a 2013 *Philadelphia Business Journal* "40 Under 40" honoree. Angelo is the recipient of the 2015 American Society of Civil Engineers, Philadelphia Section, Environmental Engineer of the Year Award.

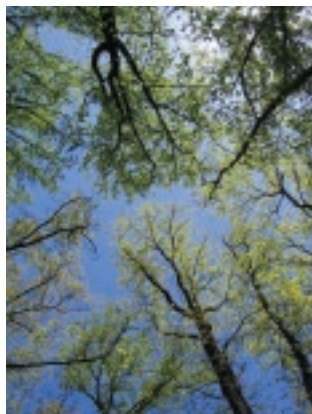
