

Dear Jenkins Family & Friends,

Change...this is something I have been thinking plenty about this year. A famous quote by Benjamin Franklin says, "One's ability to adapt to those changes will determine your success in life." PICKING UP THE PIECES

As Heraclitus said, "The only thing that is constant is change". Oh, how true it is! We have seen many changes at the Arboretum in recent years. Most of these changes are subtle or "behind the scenes", however you cannot miss what has happened in the garden in the past year. Though there are always changes happening throughout the garden, the most obvious are at the pond and the surrounding landscape. Last June's devastating storms left this area in ruin; in some areas, there was nothing left. We were left to pick up the pieces, but what an exciting opportunity – to rethink an entire landscape, how it looked and how it functioned. We had the opportunity to improve both the ornamental value and the ecological value of our garden. In the year that has passed, there has been a lot of thinking, and rethinking, and we have already made many significant changes.

The large area where the pines once stood has now been replanted with hundreds of new plants. Several medium-sized trees were planted in the middle of this area including a yellowwood, sour gum, and American smoketree. They are flanked by a great collection of low to medium-sized shrubs which include the fragrant sumac variety called 'Lacette', the southern bush honeysuckle variety called 'Butterfly', and the coastal azalea variety called 'Marydel'. All of these are new to the garden! We have filled the front edge of this planting area with a variety of low-growing perennials. These wildflowers include an aromatic aster called 'October Skies', an evening primrose called 'Siskiyou Pink', and a shale barren buckwheat called 'Little Rascal'. Once again, all of these are new additions to the Arboretum's collections.


You will see more changes as well as we continue planting ornamental trees and shrubs, like dogwoods, redbuds, and silverbells along the fence-line bordering Berwyn Baptist Road. Thanks to a grant from the Hardy Plant Society/Mid Atlantic Group, we were able to purchase several larger specimens, including a trio of green hawthorns which were planted above the pond. This is an area that, just one year ago, was so densely vegetated that you could barely see through to the landscape beyond. The combination of losses and removals opened up some amazing vistas and we are also going to be taking advantage of that by adding some stunning native vines to the pond fence.

It has been a long, challenging 12 months, but all in all, these changes have made, and will continue to make the garden so much better. We are excited to watch these new additions grow and hope you stop by often to see the progress.

As they say, all good things must come to an end. Sadly, we say this every year as one of our Hamilton Fellows finishes the Fellowship and moves on to the next phase of their career. This year, we said goodbye to Heather Titanich who had been with us since June of 2019. Heather's tenure with Jenkins was unusual to say the least. It seems that spring is always the busiest season at a public garden, but despite being here for nearly two years, she never experienced what we would call a "normal" spring. Starting the Fellowship in June meant she missed that first year's plant sale, Spring Blooms Gala, and many of the spring programs, workshops, and flower shows typically held at Jenkins. She also missed the peak bloom that season. Then, her second spring was interrupted by the Covid-19 pandemic and all the cancellations that came along with it, though she did finally get to see the garden in all its spring glory.

Heather was an invaluable part of the horticulture team. Being such a small organization, everyone, including our Fellows, does a little bit of everything. Over the past two years, Heather did more than just a little bit! It was a particularly ambitious

time with a lot of digging and heavy lifting. In addition to presenting educational programs and contributing to the daily maintenance of the garden, she helped to plant dozens of large screening trees and heavy balled and burlapped azaleas. She also spent months alongside the rest of the horticulture team cleaning up from last June's storms and then replanting new garden beds after the damage.

For her Fellow project, Heather cataloged and mapped all the herbaceous plants along our woodland garden paths. This was no small task as we had never before tracked our herbaceous collections. Now, we have all that information recorded in our plant records database and put out new plant label stakes this past spring.

Heather has moved on from Jenkins to lead the Urban and Community Forestry program at the Delaware Center for Horticulture where she will be involved in the development, administration, and implementation of urban forestry programs in Wilmington. We wish her all the best as she embarks on this next chapter of her career!

Understanding site conditions is essential to planning and planting a successful landscape. Landscape architect Jennifer Pennington will discuss principles of ecological landscape management and design, as well as some common horticultural pitfalls related to site conditions such as poor drainage, sun and wind exposure, and invasive weed sources. On Friday, learn how to evaluate the varied conditions of your property and complete a site analysis plan. On Saturday, participants will select a small focus area and begin crafting a plant list and plan for long term garden success. THE VARIETIES OF MYCOLOGICAL EXPERIENCE Thursday, July 15, 7:00 - 8:30 pm



Presented by Doug Bierend, freelance writer and author of In Search of Mycotopia: Citizen Science, Fungi Fanatics, and the Untapped Potential of Mushrooms

Around the country, growing numbers of people are discovering the many wonders and possibilities posed by fungi. But beyond providing food, medicine, sustainable materials, innovative remediation techniques, and enchanted forest outings, the under-examined kingdom of fungi also offers unexpected opportunities to reconsider how we connect with nature, and with one another. Unraveling the long history of environmentalism, colonialism, and race, this talk will discuss the complexities of conservation and the continued inequities that continue to plague natural history.






