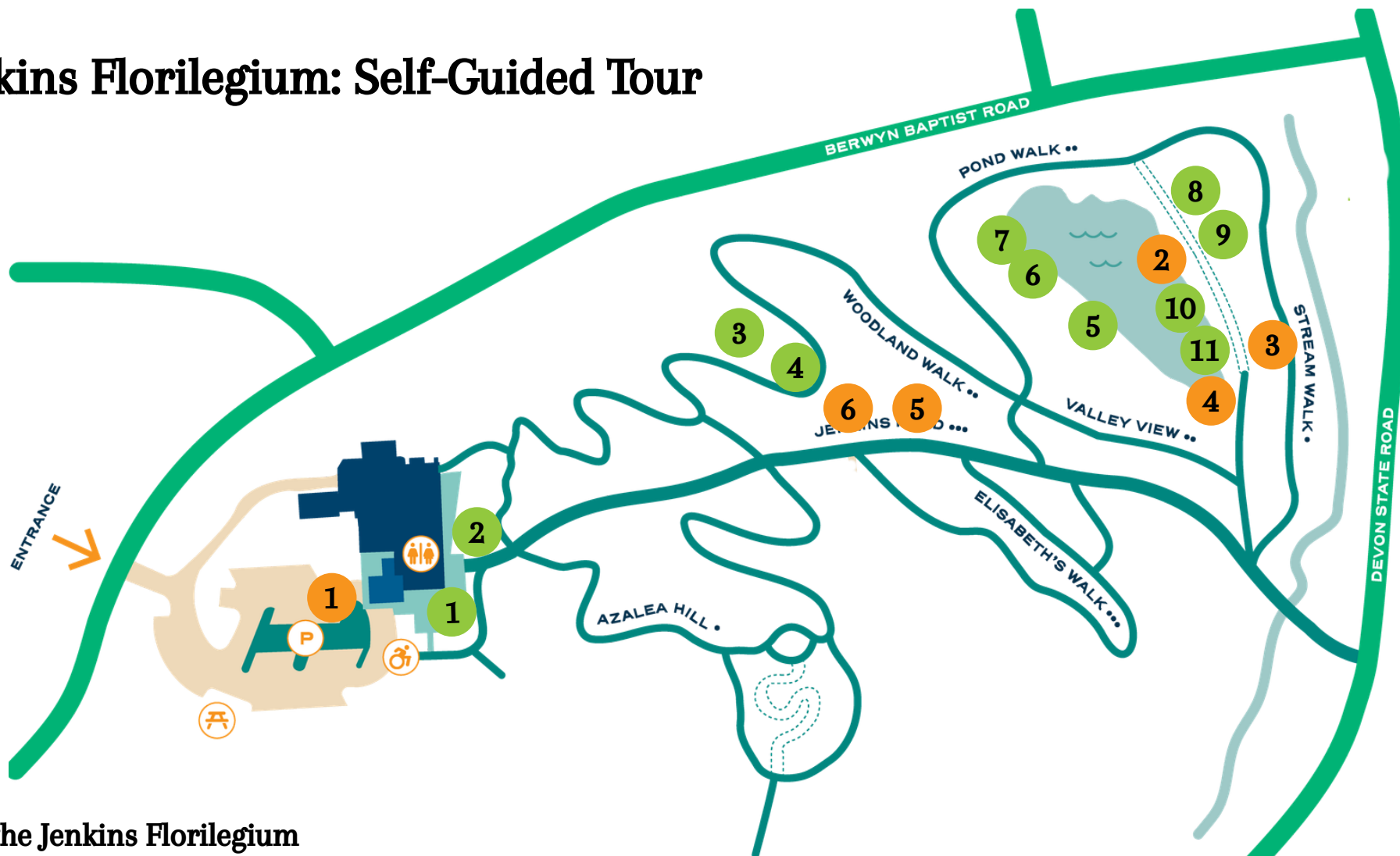


Jenkins Florilegium: Self-Guided Tour



About the Jenkins Florilegium

The Jenkins Florilegium is a collection of artworks by artists Carol Ashton-Hergenhan, Deborah Dion, and Susan L. Mintun that serves as a record of plants chosen to represent the regional beauty of Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens. Over the course of seven years, the artists have completed 35 works, each a tribute to the botanical richness of Jenkins. This self-guided tour features 17 plants from the Florilegium, along with characteristics that are especially interesting for viewing in late summer and early fall.

Trees & Shrubs

1 Sweetbay magnolia

Magnolia virginiana
Cone-shaped reddish-brown seed pods



2 Buttonbush

Cephalanthus occidentalis
Hard, seed-filled “buttons”



3 Franklin tree

Franklinia alatamaha
Showy white blossoms



4 Bald cypress

Taxodium distichum
Feathery-green foliage that turns russet in fall



5 Pawpaw

Asimina triloba
Oblong, yellowish-green fruits



6 White oak

Quercus alba
Fallen acorns and colorful foliage in fall



Perennials & Vines

1 Cinnamon fern

Osmundastrum cinnamomeum
An ancient, lacy fern



2 Green dragon

Arisaema dracontium
Find cones of colorful berries



3 Sensitive fern

Onoclea sensibilis
Gently-lobed fronds and stiff, fertile stalks



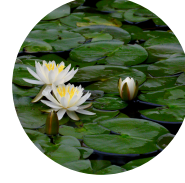
4 Northern maidenhair fern

Adiantum pedatum
Known for its radiating fronds



5 American waterlily

Nymphaea odorata
Lilypads with fragrant white flowers



6 Broadleaf cattail

Typha latifolia
Brown cylindrical spikes



7 Purple passionflower

Passiflora incarnata
Egg-shaped, yellow-green fruits



8 Stokes' aster

Stokesia laevis
Purplish-blue plants that grow 1-2 feet tall



9 Butterflyweed

Asclepias tuberosa
Clusters of bright orange flowers



10 Trumpet honeysuckle

Lonicera sempervirens
Reddish-pink tube-like flowers will bloom until frost



11 Pitcherplants

Sarracenia spp.
“Pitchers” with umbrella-like flowers found in bogs
